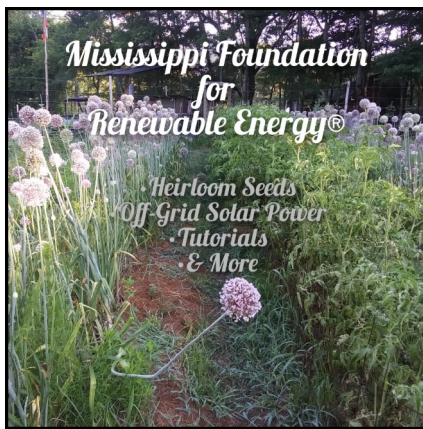

Vegetable Seeds:



Asparagus

(Asparagus officinalis)

40 seeds

Start indoors 8-12 weeks before last frost. Plant starts 2 feet apart in good loose soil after last frost. Requires full sun. Harvest after 2nd year & thereafter.

Willow Leaf Butter Beans

(Phaseolus vulgaris)

30 seeds

An old fashioned rare variety. Small beans with long slender leaves.

Beans green when fresh, but dry white.

Vigorous growth (good on a fence).

Plant outdoors after last frost. Space 4 inches apart.

Pinto Beans

(Phaseolus vulgaris)

30 seeds

Semi-runner

Pole or fence (tip: plant on both sides of a fence for high yield).

Plant outdoors after last frost.

Space 4 inches apart or closer.

Soy Beans

(phaseolus vulgaris)

30 seeds

Heirloom edamame

Bush

Plant outdoors after last frost.

Space 8 inches or more apart.

Great for making soy milk in the blender!

(Phaseolus vulgaris)

30 seeds

Louisiana Purple Pod

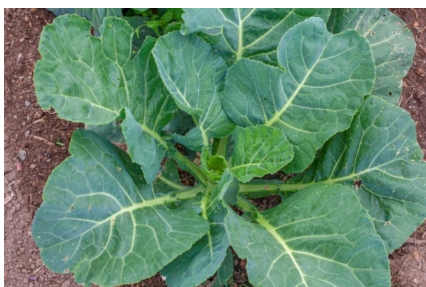
Purple pods are easy to spot on the vine, and turn green when cooked. Grows well on poles or a fence.

Plant outdoors after last frost.

Space 3 inches apart.

"Old Time" Collards

(Brassica oleracea "acephala")

200 seeds

Special variety.

Widely grown as a cool season crop, this variety can produce all year in most areas.

Start indoors or direct sow at any time of year.

Requires at least 40 degrees F to germinate reliably.

Sikkim Cucumber

(Cucumis sativus)

10 seeds

This extremely unique cultivar from the eastern Himalayas has a deep history.

Unlike other cucumbers, these are excellent when eaten fully mature, & can reach several pounds!

Direct sow after last frost, in hills of 4 seeds (or less) spaced 3 feet apart. Provide a trellis.

Pickling Cucumber

(Cucumis sativus)

25 seeds

Great for pickling, and slicing as well when harvested early. This variety is a vigorous grower.

Direct sow after last frost, in hills of 4 seeds spaced 3 feet apart. Provide a trellis.

Armenian Cucumber

(Cucumis melo)

25 seeds

Also known as yard long cucumber, these long

fruits reach up to 36 inches in length while remaining tender & sweet. Technically a true melon, the cucumber like flavor makes for excellent pickles or fresh sliced snacks. Skin is thin & smooth.

Direct sow after last frost, in hills of 4 seeds (or less) spaced 3 feet apart. Provide a trellis, or grow on ground.

Ping Tung Eggplant

(Solanum melongena)

25 seeds

Long purple fruit is excellent in any dish (tip: try making eggplant french fries!).

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Set out in garden well after last frost when it's nice and warm. Slow to start, but really take off in the summer and produce high yields of delicious fruit. Very drought tolerant.

Birdhouse Gourd

25 seeds

Make birdhouses or other crafts. With the right sized hole, purple martins (which eat mosquitoes) can house up and swoop over your yard feeding. Direct sow after last frost. Sprawling vines need plenty of room (can be trellised, or grown on ground).

Luffa Gourd

25 seeds

Once dried and shucked (remove outer shell), one is left with a natural sponge for bathing or washing dishes! Specialty craft soaps can be made from laterally cut pieces, providing an abrasive scrubbie and soap all at the same time.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost (require a relatively long growing season), or direct sow after last frost. Grow on a large trellis (a fence works best).

Leek (Giant)

(*Allium ampeloprasum*)

200 seeds

Direct sow in garden any time (fall is best). Grows 3+ feet tall, and 2+ inches in diameter. Broadcast seed across rows. Great substitute for onions all year long! Entire stalk is edible.

Leaf Lettuce Mix

(*Lactuca sativa*)

200 seeds

Rich in vitamin A.

Direct sow in garden in early spring or early fall.

Broadcast across rows for a blanket of greens.

Continuously harvest. Plant successions every two weeks for a steady bounty.

Great Lakes Lettuce

(*Lactuca sativa*)

200 seeds

Heading type with crisp, crunchy texture. Great producer.

Rich in vitamin A.

Direct sow in garden in early spring or early fall.

Broadcast across rows for a blanket of greens.

Continuously harvest. Plant successions every two weeks for a steady bounty.

Salad Bowl Lettuce

(*Lactuca sativa*)

200 seeds

Super sweet variety known for its oak shaped leaves.

Rich in vitamin A.

Direct sow in garden in early spring or early fall.

Broadcast across rows for a blanket of greens.

Continuously harvest. Plant successions every two weeks for a steady bounty.

Butter Crunch Lettuce

(*Lactuca sativa*)

200 seeds

Soft leaves with a very sweet flavor. This variety is known for its compact size.

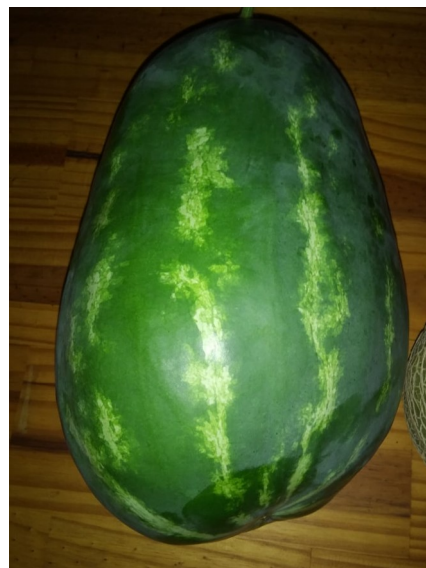
Rich in vitamin A.

Direct sow in garden in early spring or early fall.

Broadcast across rows for a blanket of greens.

Continuously harvest. Plant successions every two weeks for a steady bounty.

Orange Watermelon

(*Citrullus vulgaris*)

25 seeds

One of the sweetest watermelons around. Orange colored flesh, medium/large fruit.

Direct sow after last frost. Requires lots of space. Plant in hills of 4 seeds spaced 3 feet apart. Will sprawl up to 20 feet or more.

Muskmelon

(Cucumis melo)

25 seeds

Widely known as cantaloupe at supermarkets, this is a false identifier. True cantaloupe has a smooth skin, while muskmelon skin has the rough web pattern texture. This muskmelon is incredibly sweet & reaches 4 pounds give or take.

Direct sow after last frost in hills of 4 seeds spaced 3 feet apart. Will sprawl up to 10 feet or more.

Sugar Baby (Ice Box) Watermelon

(Citrullus lanatus)

25 seeds

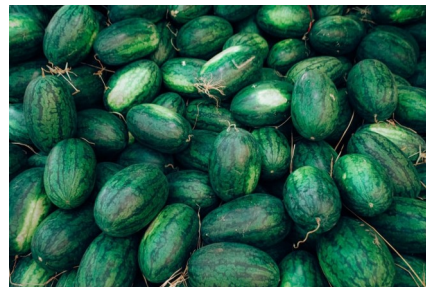
Extremely dark colored skin without stripes. 8-10 pound fruit, 6-8 inches in diameter. Extremely popular variety, this icebox sized watermelon has extremely dark skin as well as the flesh inside.

80 days

Direct sow after last frost in hills of 4 seeds spaced 3 feet apart. Will sprawl up to 10 feet or more.

Mountain Sweet Yellow Watermelon

(Citrullus lanatus)

10 seeds

20-35 pounds, oblong shape, dark striped skin. Originally from Africa, this yellow fleshed watermelon boast a very high sugar content. A favorite here on the farm.

90 days

Direct sow after last frost in hills of 4 seeds spaced 3 feet apart. Will sprawl up to 10 feet or more.

Mustard

(Brassica juncea)

150-200 seeds

Extremely high in minerals, mustard leaves are eaten as a cooked green. Seeds are easily ground in the blender with vinegar to make the condiment mustard. This is a brown seeded variety great for making dijon type mustards.

Burgundy Okra

(Abelmoschus esculentus)

30 seeds

This is a dwarf variety, reaching only 5 or 6 feet tall bearing 5 to 6 inch pods. Beautiful red pods turn green when cooked.

Direct sow after last frost when it really warms up.

Plant 1 or 2 seeds every 2 feet in rows. Harvest continuously until first fall frost.

Emerald Green Okra

(Abelmoschus esculentus)

30 seeds

This okra gets tall, often reaching a height of 10 feet or more. Very long pods that remain tender even when quite large.

Direct sow after last frost when it really warms up.

Plant 1 or 2 seeds every 2 feet in rows. Harvest continuously until first fall frost.

Bunching Onion

(Allium cepa)

250 seeds

Bunching onions multiply in the ground, and by seed. Small bulbs (1 inch) that produce all year long. Every garden should have a corner dedicated to growing bunching onions. Large 2 foot tall foliage.

Direct sow any time, or start in an open flat indoors for transplants.

Parsnip (Harris Model)

(Pastinaca sativa)

600 seeds

Parsnip is an excellent substitute for carrots. Much easier to grow, and highly productive. Great in any dish, and makes a spectacular base for hot sauces. Direct sow in fall or spring. Broadcast seed across rows. Requires light to germinate.

Purple Hull (MS Top Pick Pinkeye)

(Vigna unguiculata)

60 seeds

Large yields of easy to harvest (top pick) peas. Expect a few harvest per planting.

Semi-vining.

Can be trellised, but not necessary.

Direct sow after last frost. Plant 1 seed every 4 inches in double rows.

Sweet Peas (Alderman "telephone pole")

(*Pisum sativum*)

60 seeds

Special variety of English pea.

Runner.

Best in cool weather. Plant in spring as soon as soil can be worked, or plant in the fall. A freeze won't kill them.

Grow on a fence. Plant one seed every 2 inches on both sides of fence.

Arbol (chile de arbol) "Hot"

(*Capsicum annuum*)

25 seeds

Very flavorful, somewhat spicy pepper that makes excellent hot sauce or crushed reds. Make beautiful ristras or lay out in a single layer to dry.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Habenero "Hot"

(*Capsicum chinense*)

25 seeds

Excellent for hot sauces. Extremely spicy, yet quite flavorful.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Cayenne (Long) "Hot"

(Capsicum annuum)

25 seeds

A staple in every spice rack. Use to make crushed red pepper. Make beautiful ristras or lay out in a single layer to dry.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Himo Togarashi "Sweet"

(Capsicum annuum)

25 seeds

If you like the taste of peppers but not the heat, this is an excellent choice. Make beautiful ristras or lay out in a single layer to dry. Make crushed reds with all the flavor, minus the heat.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Jalapeno "Hot"

(Capsicum annuum)

25 seeds

Standard large jalapeno. This is a relatively hot variety that grows plenty large enough for stuffing. Tried and true. Very reliable year after year.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Jalapeno (Orange) "Hot"

(Capsicum annuum)

10 seeds

Relatively new variety. Skin is thinner than jalapeno M. Adds a visual flare to any dish or salsa!

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Pequin "Hot"

(Capsicum annuum)

15 seeds

Very spicy with an unbelievable flavor. Dry and use

as crushed reds, or make excellent sauces. This cultivar is elongated rather than round which provides a larger yield than normal. Survives winter in warmer regions, and even makes an attractive landscape plant in beds.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Pimento "Semi-Sweet"

(Capsicum annuum)

25 seeds

Somewhat mild large pepper. Commonly harvested when red, diced and canned for use in cheese spread. Pimentos are also great for stuffing (large like a bell pepper).

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Sweet Pepper "Sweet"

(Capsicum annuum)

15 seeds

Sweet multicolored peppers. Loaded with green, red, orange, and yellow peppers about the size of a jalapeno. No heat at all.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Tabasco "hot"

(Capsicum frutescens)

15 seeds

Used to make pepper sauces, but can also be cooked in food. Fairly spicy. Ripen red. Plants are very large and almost resemble small trees. A beautiful annual landscape plant, or high production crop.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Violet Sparkle "Sweet"

(Capsicum annuum)

15 seeds

A truly unique sweet pepper. Large purple fruits boast tons of flavor with a very sweet taste. Starts out light green, turns purple, then orange.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Apocalypse Scorpion

(Capsicum chinense)

25 seeds

Our favorite superhot pepper, the apocalypse scorpion may very well be the hottest pepper in the world. Developed by the Italian pepper growing association AIASP, this chile has a Scoville rating of at least 1,400,000. The variety is not fully stable & has not been "officially" tested yet, but stands a strong chance of becoming the next worlds hottest variety, rivaling the Carolina Reaper in heat.

Despite the extreme heat, the apocalypse scorpion brings sweet, fruity, floral notes to hot sauces. We have been a partner in the stabilization of the apocalypse scorpion pepper since its release, & our seed stock is the furthest generation into its stabilization out there.

Marina Di Chioggia

(Cucurbita maxima)

15 seeds

Deep, dark colored flesh. The most flavorful pumpkin around. Its squat appearance and warty skin make for a very unique attraction.

Medium/large fruit. By far the sweetest & most delectable of all.

Plant after last frost in hills of 4 seeds every 3 feet.

Needs lots of room to sprawl.

Pie Pumpkin

(Cucurbita pepo)

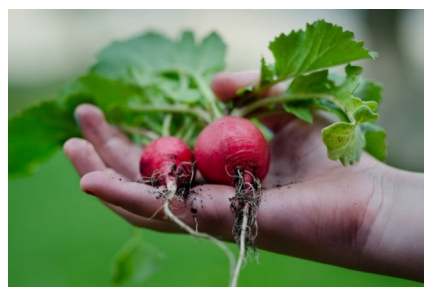
20 seeds

Small fruit (makes 2 pies). Great tasting little pumpkins sized just right for the table. Heavy producer.

Plant after last frost in hills of 4 seeds every 3 feet.

Needs lots of room to sprawl.

Scarlet Globe Radish

(Raphanus sativus)

200 seeds

Just a great all around radish.

Direct sow in spring or fall.

Broadcast across rows.

Plant successions every 2 weeks for a constant supply.

Spaghetti Squash (winter)

(Cucurbita pepo)

20 seeds

The name says it all. This squash will last all winter on the shelf. Underneath that yellow peel lies flesh that is so similar to spaghetti it will fool you.

Requires plenty of room to sprawl.

Direct sow after last frost in hills of 4 seeds every 3 feet.

Tahitian Squash (winter)

(Cucurbita moschata)

20 seeds

Shaped like a butternut squash, but reaches 2-3 feet long. Ripens tan in color. Will last all year on the shelf. A suitable length of the neck can be sliced off for a meal, and if left standing upright, the cut on the leftover squash will heal over with a sugar coating on its own.

Direct sow after last frost in hills of 4 seeds every 3 feet. Can also grow on a fence.

Requires plenty of room to sprawl.

Yellow Crook Neck (summer)

(Cucurbita moschata)

20 seeds

Standard yellow squash that is super productive.

Bush type.

Direct sow after last frost 2 seeds every 2 feet of row.

Zucchini (summer)

(Cucurbita pepo)

20 seeds

Old classic summer squash.

Bush type.

Direct sow after last frost 2 seeds every 2 feet of row.

Zucchini Rampicante (summer/winter)

(Cucurbita moschata)

20 seeds

Interesting, very long slender squash that is eaten as a summer squash when still green, and saves as a winter squash when fully ripened to tan. Very tasty either way.

Vines need plenty of room to sprawl, a fence being an ideal trellis.

Rio Grande Tomatillo

(Physalis ixocarpa)

25 seeds

Tried and true variety. Great for making salsa verde, & also chopped up on tacos or in migas.

Grows best on a trellis, but not absolutely necessary.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Cherokee Purple (indeterminate)

(Lycopersicon lycopersicum)

If you only grow one variety, this is the one. Its been called ugly by some, wabi sabi by others, but one thing that most everyone agrees on is that it is one of the best tasting tomatoes in existence. Highly productive.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost. Grow in cages or on poles, spaced at least 2 feet apart.

Veasley Cherry (indeterminate)

(Lycopersicon lycopersicum)

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts disappointed.

in garden after last frost. Grow in cages or on poles, spaced at least 2 feet apart.

Marianas Peace (indeterminate)

(Lycopersicon lycopersicum)

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost. Grow in cages or on poles, spaced at least 2 feet apart.

Watermelon Beefsteak (indeterminate)

(Lycopersicon lycopersicum)

Very large beefsteak type. Very few seeds. The meat inside is pink like a watermelon, and just about as sweet. Few gardeners grow this one, but every gardener should give it a try. You won't be

disappointed.

Start indoors 6 weeks before last frost. Plant starts in garden after last frost. Grow in cages or on poles, spaced at least 2 feet apart.

Hops:

Hops (tett nang)

(Humulus lupulus)

Two 8 inch long rhizomes.

Tett nang is a noble variety, meaning that it developed naturally without human interference. Originating in Germany, this perennial bine (like a vine, but lacking tendrils) is tolerant of very cold winters. It's also quite heat and drought tolerant.

Touted as the "king of noble hops" due to its versatility, both bittering & aromatic (piney scent), this variety is an excellent choice for the hobby brewer (makes a nice tea as well).

Order rhizomes in early spring after preparing soil and erecting a tall trellis (12-20 feet). Two 8 inch rhizomes will be all you need per trellis. Pre-ordering is a good idea & you won't have to pay

until it's time to ship. Just let us know the quantity you expect to need. We'll let you know by email when harvest time approaches. Rhizomes must be planted as soon as received.

Tobacco:



Tobacco (negro)

(*Nicotiana tabacum*)

100 seeds (approx)

5 to 6 feet tall.

Needs at least 4 1/2 months of growing season.

Leaves 12-14 inches wide, by 20-22 inches long.

Negro (Spanish for "black") is a burley type tobacco with a very dark leaf after curing. Used for cigar wrappers, cigarette & cigar filler, snuff, and chew. This is an extremely versatile variety.

Tolerant of poor soils, & can thrive in a wide range of soil PH.

Full sun, to partial shade (leaves grown for wrappers can grow larger in partial shade, but will be less productive).

Requires bright light for germination.

Start seeds indoors directly on top of soil 8-10 weeks before last frost. Make sure they are in a well lit, very warm (68 degrees or higher) area (ie.

greenhouse, seeding room, bright window, or under artificial light).

Plant starts in garden after last frost.

Tobacco likes it warm, so don't get in a hurry to set them out.

Tip: Tobacco makes for a beautiful landscape plant for beds. The flowers are absolutely amazing!

Berries:



Blackberry

(*Rubus* spp)

75 seeds

Wild blackberry native to the southern United States. Has thorns, which equates to a superior flavor when compared to the thornless varieties sold at supermarkets. Seriously packed with flavor! Packed with nutrients, vitamins, and antioxidants. Start indoors (or outdoors under rain cover).

Temperature needs to be warm (around 70 degrees F, or slightly less if necessary)

Press seeds slightly into soil. Requires light for germination.

Produces in second year.

Plant in ground when roots fully develop. Will spread (invasive), so choose an area you can mow around.

Black Cherry

(*Prunus serotina*)

20 seeds

Large tree reaching 50 to 80 feet tall bearing tons of small black cherries. Use to make wonderful pies, extracts, juice, wine, and many more. Difficult if not impossible to come by commercially, black cherries offer a flavor sought after by many. The tree itself is merchantable as black cherry lumber is worth quite a bit of money to a furniture or cabinet maker. Also makes an excellent firewood for cooking.

Requires stratification. Mix seeds in a ziploc bag of potting soil that is moist but not wet, and keep the bag in the refrigerator for 3 months. Remove and plant in pots. Plant in final location once roots fully develop.

Elderberry

(*Sambucus canadensis*)

20 seeds

Easy to harvest by removing the entire heads from the shrub. Elderberry has many medicinal uses. Make tinctures, wine, jam, and many other fun products.

Requires stratification twice. Expose seeds to normal indoor temperature for several months. Then expose to normal winter temperature for 3 months. Mix seeds in a ziploc bag of potting soil

that is moist but not wet. Expose bag to normal indoor temperature for 3 months. Place bag in refrigerator for 4 months then sow seeds in pots or seed beds. Plant in final location once roots fully develop.

Grape (Muscadine)

(*Vitis rotundifolia*)

20 seeds

Not your average grape from the store, muscadines have a wildly robust flavor mimicked by none.

Makes some of the best jam imaginable, and wine that no other can rival. Large and very easy to harvest. Many health benefits!

Requires stratification. Mix seeds in a ziploc bag of potting soil that is moist but not wet, and keep the bag in the refrigerator for 3 months. Remove and plant in pots. Plant in final location once roots fully develop.

Strawberry (alpine)

(Fragaria vesca)

75 seeds

Wild strawberry. Smaller than standard store bought strawberries, but much more resilient and flavorful.

Mix of red and white strawberries.

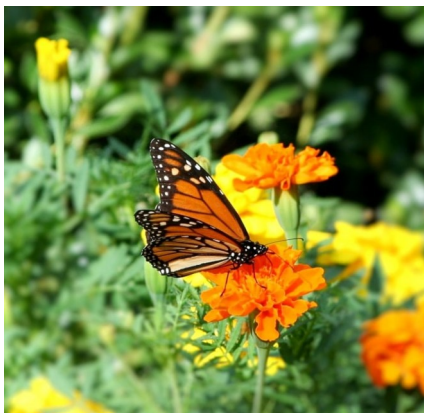
Temperature needs to be warm (around 70 degrees F, or slightly less if necessary)

Marigold (mix)

(Tagetes erecta)

Direct sow in rows after last frost in full sun. Space seeds 10 inches apart, about 1 inch deep. Another alternative is to plant them randomly in flower beds.

the first stalks after harvesting grain, but the sugar content will be lower.

Sorghum makes a remarkable flour and is extremely easy to harvest, winnow, and grind. As a matter of fact, most store bought flour is made from a mix of ground sorghum and wheat.

Direct sow in garden or field after last frost.

Sorghum likes it warm, so don't get in a hurry. Wait until the soil temperature is 70 degrees and not excessively wet.

Thinly broadcast seeds across rows, spacing seeds about 6 inches apart.

germination.

Just put a few in your mouth for a crisp, tart, candy like flavor (don't swallow the actual seeds, spit them out when the flavor is gone). Beneficial for many species of wildlife.

From MSU extension, "Sumac is reported to have several medicinal benefits. American Indians used it to treat colds, fever and scurvy while also grinding the berries mixed with clay and using as a salve on open wounds. Sumac has also shown to have benefits for treating diarrhea, dysentery, sore throats, infections, asthma and cold sores. Sumac berries are also used in beekeeping smokers".
